Uniform Policy

Christ the King Catholic Primary School pupils wear their uniform with pride. Our uniform shows that we are part of the Christ the King Catholic Primary School community. We have the highest expectations from our pupils with regards to school uniform and appearance, and strongly believe that our high standards promote positive behaviour, support effective teaching and learning and contribute to the ethos of the school.

School Uniform

We have school uniform and we encourage all our children to wear their uniform smartly. All items of uniform must be labelled. It consists of the following:

All year round	Summer Term – October Half term break.
 Plain white shirt/blouse and school tie. Nursery Children - School jumper/cardigan with the school logo A charcoal grey/black trousers or skirt. <i>All of <u>which must be no</u> shorter than just above the knee</i> A pair of grey/white socks or navy blue/ grey tights. A pair of sensible black leather school shoes, NOT boots, shoes with heels or trainers Girls who, for reasons linked to their faith, wish to wear a headscarf may wear a plain white scarf arranged in a simple style. The face must not be covered. 	 A white polo shirt with/ without the school logo. Shorts for both girls and boys during the summer months, which <u>must be no shorter than just above the knee.</u> A blue and white checked (all over) dress/ playsuit <u>which must be no shorter than just above the knee.</u> <i>May a shorter than just above the knee.</i>

PE Kit

We require that our pupils wear their PE kit to school on the day of their lesson. Pupils need an appropriately labelled PE kit consisting of the following:

- Sports trainers (not fashion trainers such as converse)
- white socks
- Navy T-shirt with the school logo
- Plain black/blue shorts (cycling shorts can be worn as 'skins' but not in the place of shorts)
- Navy tracksuit with the school logo for outdoor games in cold weather or a plain Navy/ Black tracksuit (no large branded logos).
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General notes on appearance:

Shirts should be tucked in at all times.

Summer uniform can be worn in the Summer term and up until October half term. From the second half of the Autumn term until Easter Winter uniform must be worn.

Jewellery:

- Jewellery should not be worn or brought into school.
- If children have pierced ears, a pair of discreet studs may be worn. Guidance states that earrings must be removed for PE lessons for health and safety reasons. If your child is unable to remove the earrings themselves they should not come to school with them in on PE days.
- No other body piercing, i.e. nose piercings are allowed.

Hairstyles:

- Hair should be one natural colour, no hair dye.
- The style should be uniform and appropriate for school. Hair should not obstruct pupils vision.
- Pupils with long hair must wear it tied back at all times.
- Boys hair should be no shorter than Grade/Number 2.
- Tramlines, patterns and sculpting is not allowed.

Students must not wear:

- Hoodies, sportswear or sweatshirts unless it is a non-uniform day.
- Any kind of boots (wellingtons are allowed during a Forest School session and in wet weather/snow but must be changed when inside the school buildings).
- Leather or denim clothing.
- Trainers are NOT allowed to be worn at any time other than for PE lessons or on PE days, dinner time and clubs.
- Make up and nail varnish should NOT be worn to school.

Electronic devices.

No electronic devices are allowed in school. Any items, such as mobile phones, will be handed into reception and available for collection by pupils/parents at the end of the day.

Non-compliance with the uniform and appearance policy:

Parents of pupils who do not wear the correct uniform., will be notified by a member of staff and asked to rectify this for the following day/ week.

Pupils who wear make-up/nail varnish or jewellery will be required to remove these and rectify this for the following day.

Items of jewellery will be confiscated by the teacher to be collected by the parent.

Persistent and defiant non-compliance with the policy will result in an appropriate sanction which may ultimately lead to exclusion.
